The Virginia Tech Roanoke Center will host the Clinical Supervision in Virginia workshop June 25 - 26, 2009. The Virginia Board of Counseling recently enacted changes to the regulations governing professional counselors, including the requirements for those who provide clinical supervision towards licensure for Master's level clinicians. These changes require that supervisors receive training in supervision "consisting of a three-credit-hour course in supervision or a 4.0-quarter-hour course in supervision, or at least 20 hours of continuing education in supervision by an approved provider." Supervisors who have provided supervision for a resident in counseling prior to September 3rd, 2008, when these changes went into effect, have until September 3rd, 2010 to meet the new requirements to continue to provide clinical supervision.

The workshop covers the legal, ethical, theoretical, and practical requirements associated with providing clinical supervision, and uses video clips of actual supervision and counseling sessions to illustrate important concepts. The workshop will meet 15 contact hours of continuing education, including 2 hours on legal and ethical issues. 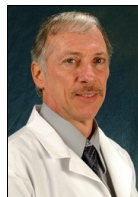

The Roanoke Valley Chapter of the Virginia Tech Alumni Association will host Tom Inzana on Wednesday, June 17, 2009 beginning at 7:00 p.m. at the Virginia Tech Roanoke Center (room 709). Inzana is the Tyler J. and Frances F. Young Professor of Bacteriology in the Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine and former director of the Center for Molecular Medicine and Infectious Diseases. Dr. Inzana is also director of the Clinical Microbiology Laboratory for the Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine Teaching Hospital. He is a diplomat of The American Board of Medical Microbiology and a Fellow of The American Academy for Microbiology. He received his Ph.D. from The University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry, and completed a postdoctoral fellowship at Baylor College of Medicine. Dr. Inzana's research interests focus on the molecular basis of bacterial capsules and lipopolysaccharides (LPS) in virulence and pathogenesis, and the host response to bacterial pathogens. Dr. Inzana's current research focus is on bacteria in the family Pasteurellaceae and on *Francisella tularensis*. The general public is invited to attend this event. Roanoke City, Roanoke City Public Schools, and Virginia Tech will recognize authors and illustrators of the Roanoke ABC book on June 9th at Westside Elementary School. The book was written and illustrated by children in the Roanoke City Schools during the 2007-2008 school year.
